Tool collection at Wymondham Baptist Church



Azizi's story:

Azizi lives in Uganda. He had a happy childhood but during his teens his family rejected him when someone made a false claim about him. His future looked bleak until someone from a church befriended him and arranged for him to join a scheme to train as a carpenter. After graduating he was given a tool kit containing all he needed to start a small carpentry business. This he did and was soon able to sell items of well made furniture. His business flourished and he was eventually able to take on another two young men, being given more

tools for them to use. Azizi has received training and a carpentry tool kit.



Namugwama from Uganda has received training in tailoring and a sewing machine and will be able to start a small business to support her family

Maria's story:

Maria also lives in Uganda. Her father abandoned the family and her mother ran a small shop to make a little money but there was not enough to enable Maria and her brother and sister to go to school. Maria longed to learn tailoring but there was no money to pay for a course. One day she heard of an organisation called Mindset which trained people in tailoring and other skills. She asked and was given a place on a course, where she also learned some business skills. At the end of the course she was given a sewing machine and haberdashery kit. She set up in her mother's shop and was soon making school uniforms and other clothes for neighbours. Now she

Graeme Ross (EBA) wrote on 25th May:

As I was praying earlier this week I was reminded that the strength of a rope is determined by the amount of strands that are woven together and it dawned on me that a rope is a helpful metaphor for what God intends His Church to be. There is only so much we can do alone, but when we are woven together our strength and effectiveness is multiplied.



Did you know that there are 57 references to 'one anothering' (eg love one another, encourage one another etc.) in the New Testament? In other words, there are 57 commands from Jesus that can't be obeyed if we try to live out our faith alone.

Do we need to repent of an individualistic attitude towards faith? Is it time to pause and consider, who is God weaving you together with? Who are your sisters and brothers in Christ who he is calling you to walk alongside? How can we work with God, rather than resisting as he weaves us together? Who can we

After six weeks of lockdown things are opening up again here in France, and little by little life is starting to get back to normal.

Last weekend my church enjoyed getting together for an outdoor service - fortunately the weather stayed warm and sunny for us, although the rain rolled in later that evening!

A change to the eligibility criteria a couple of weeks ago meant that I was able to get my first dose of the Pfizer vaccine last week. A number of my friends and teammates have also been vaccinated and so we will soon be able to get together safely. Over the next couple of weeks I hope to be able to restart the Bible study group that we had begun before lockdown. I've been able to get hold of a copy of Luke's gospel in Uzbek, which is my muslim friend Irene's first language. Please pray that Irene will be excited to read the Word of God in her own language and for good conversations to come from what she reads.

8. Bake the cake in the preheated oven for 1 hour and 10 minutes to 1 hour and 30 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted inserted into the center comes out clean. Remove the cake from the oven and cool for 10 minutes in the pan. Remove cake from the springform pan and peel off the parchment paper. Finish cooling on a rack. Dust about 1 tbsp of powdered sugar over the top of the cake after cooled. Serve it warm or cool.

Gardener's Corner

Now we have got wet and windy May out of the way we can hopefully enjoy June relaxing in the garden and keeping the outside looking good. The important jobs to do during June are to

- Keep hanging baskets and new plants well watered
- Mow your lawns weekly, trim the borders and hoe to keep the weeds down
- Use water wisely, don't waste water in the home, use it to water the garden
- Get young children involved in the garden, I can assure you they will enjoy it.



Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°. Line a 9" springform pan with parchment paper and grease the sides of the pan.
- 2. In a large mixing bowl, toss together the washed and dried blueberries and cornstarch(I use icing sugar sometimes and it is just as good) until the berries are well coated. Set aside.
- 3. In a large mixing bowl, cream together the butter, sugar, vanilla and lemon zest until light and fluffy, about 3 minutes. Add the eggs, one at a time, and mix well after each addition.
- 4. Add the ricotta cheese, directly to the butter mixture.
- 5. In a separate bowl, combine the flour, baking powder, and salt. Remove the creamed mixture bowl from the stand mixer and sift the dry ingredients into the batter, then fold with a spatula just until combined.
- 6. Gently stir in the lemon juice, if using (highly recommended). Add 2 1/2 cups of the blueberries to the batter and fold them in.
- 7. Transfer the batter into the prepared pan and spread the batter evenly to the edges. Add the remaining 1/2 cup of blueberries over the top, pressing them down lightly.



Recipe for June



Blueberry and lemon ricotta tea cake

Ingredients:-

- 3 Cup fresh blueberries
- 3 tbsp cornstarch (icing sugar works well too)
- 1 Cup butter, softened
- 1 Cup sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- zest from 2 lemons (about 1 1/2 tsp)
- 4 large eggs, room temperature
- 1 Cup ricotta
- 2 1/2 Cup all-purpose flour (can use gluten free flour)
- 4 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 tsp fresh lemon juice
- powdered sugar, for dusting

As part of marking this next chapter, we have a new rallying call, which we hope and pray will bring together more support from Christians around the world:



Pause For Thought

Therefore I urge you brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices. (Romans 12:1)

Walter Lewis Wilson was an American doctor in the nineteenth century. A visiting speaker once asked him, 'Who is the Holy Spirit to you?'

Wilson answered, 'One of the Persons of the Godhead - teacher, guide, Third Person of the Trinity.' The visitor continued, 'You haven't answered my question.' Wilson opened up with real candour, 'He's nothing to me. I have contact with him and can usually get along just fine without him'

The following year, Wilson heard another speaker, who bellowed from the pulpit, 'Have you noticed that our verse in Romans 12 doesn't tell us to whom we should give our bodies? It's not the Lord Jesus, He has his own body. It's not the Father. He remains on his throne. Another has come to earth without a body. God gives you the indescribable honour of presenting your bodies to the Holy Spirit to be his dwelling place on earth.'

Wilson was struck to the core and rushed home to seek the Lord. He fell on his face and pleaded with the Lord: 'My Lord, I've treated you like a servant. When I wanted you, I called to you. Now I give you this body from my head to my feet It's your body from this moment on.'

The next morning, Wilson was working in his surgery when two women arrived trying to sell him advertising. He immediately led them to Christ.

The previous night's surrender had enabled him to access new power from on high. From that day on his life entered a new dimension of evangelistic fruitfulness. He went on to pioneer a church plant, a mission organisation and a Bible college. Excerpt from 'Choose Life', S. Guillebaud
