GLUTEN-FREE STOLLEN BITES

- 340 g gluten-free self raising flour
 ¼ tsp xanthan gum
 1 tsp gluten free baking powder
 85 g cold butter
 60 g caster sugar
 50 g ground almonds
 150 g marzipan grated
 100 g dried fruit chopped finely
 1 large egg
 150 ml milk
 3 tsp lemon juice
 2 tsp almond extract
 Zest of 1 lemon or orange
 lcing sugar for dusting
 - 1. Preheat Oven to 200C Fan/220C Prepare baking sheet with baking parchment
 - 2. Place GF self raising flour, baking powder and xanthan gum in a bowl. Chop cold butter into cubes and add to the flour. Rub in with your fingers until it forms what looks like breadcrumbs.
 - 3. Stir in caster sugar, ground almonds, grated marzipan and chopped dried fruit. Add zest of orange or lemon.
 - 4. Warm milk in a jug, don't make it really hot. Add lemon juice and allow to stand for 1-2 minutes it should curdle a little.
 - 5. Add the egg and almond extract to the milk mixture. Beat together so your egg is combined.
 - 6. Make a well in the middle of dry mixture. Pour in the milk/egg mixture and work it in using a metal fork or knife. Keep working it till it forms a sticky dough.
 - 7. Dust your hand and the surface with GF flour. Take a small amount of the dough and roll it in your hands into a slightly flattened ball. Place on prepared tray, leave gaps between each ball.
 - 8. Bake in the preheated oven for 12-15 minutes until golden.
 - 9. Remove from oven and allow to cool briefly on the tray before transferring to a cooling rack.
 - 10. Dust heavily with icing sugar and enjoy cold or slightly warm.

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

- It's read by a variety of people/voices from the 24-7 prayer team, including Pete Greig, author of a number of great books on prayer.






Home from Home -

A WORD FROM ROSEDALES

Christmas greetings from Sarah and Beverley- Bereavement Support Group facilitators at Rosedale.



2022 has been yet another very eventful year. We have had 3 Prime Ministers, a record breaking 70th Jubilee celebration followed by the death of our beloved monarch, a new King and war in Europe again. Our economy has been battered and bruised and families struggle to make ends meet.

For many families who have lost a loved one this year, 2022 will be a year they will never forget. Christmas can be yet another painful reminder of all that has been lost.

The build up to Christmas can be stressful and bring feelings of dread as we anticipate the empty space where our loved one should be.

I can imagine that the Royal family will find their Christmas this year is difficult and very different to what has gone before.

We are used to seeing the Queen's extended family gather together at Sandringham for Christmas and attend church on Christmas morning. We may not see that again as the New King decides to do things differently.

Often the older matriarch of a family has a way of bringing all members of the family together, perhaps organising a large collective celebration, carrying on familiar traditions, remembering what everyone likes to eat or gifts people like to receive. They can be like the glue that holds everyone together.

Of course, not everyone has an 'idyllic' Christmas or a family to share it with.

Christmas comes in all shapes, sizes and budgets. It is important to do what suits you at Christmas. There is no rule book.

This is also true with bereavement, there is no right or wrong way to grieve and timescales and intensity are unique to each person.

If you are bereaved, the following tips may help you decide how you want your Christmas to be this year:

- days instead.
- any people will understand.
- choose not to do this. However, others find this enables them to grieve, as they recall Christmases past.
- of real life no one should feel pressurised to feel 'jolly' at Christmas.
- Christmas movies portray happy loving families, beautifully (and expensively) decorated



 Some people find comfort in keeping their traditions the same- others find this is too painful and choose to do things very differently and invent new 'traditions' like going away for a few

• It can be painful signing just one name in Christmas cards so some people choose not to send

Putting up the usual tree and decorations can be loaded with difficult memories- some people

You may want to talk about your loved one at Christmas and include them as part of the celebration - raise a glass to them at lunch, celebrate the memories you shared together. Shedding a few tears is normal, healthy and shows you loved them. Tears and sadness are part

homes, snow on the ground and everyone getting along wonderfully. Most of us know this is pure fantasy! Take the pressure off yourself and do what is realistic and affordable instead.

- Throughout the Christmas period, spend some time alone if you need to. Go for a walk or run to relieve the pressure. Write in a journal about your thoughts and feelings.
- Some people choose to be alone on Christmas day and don't want the pressure of being around others. Others find that being around people can be a great distraction and support.
- If you cannot cope with parties this year, explain to the host that although you appreciate the invitation, you do not feel strong enough yet. On the other hand, you may find it comforting to be with others you can always leave early if it becomes overwhelming.

And finally, every year, Rosedale offers **Christmas candles** to anyone who is bereaved. At 11am on Christmas morning, we invite the lighting of the candle and time to pause and think about our loved one. Many others will be doing the same thing at the same time, so we know we are not alone in our grief. These are available now and can be collected from all the Rosedale branches in Norfolk and Suffolk - including Wymondham. Rosedale also holds Christmas services of remembrance in many towns in Norfolk and Suffolkcheck the Rosedale website for more details.

Wymondham Baptist Church and Rosedale work together to extend a warm welcome to anyone who has been bereaved, (no matter how long ago or which funeral director was used) to the Christmas Service of Remembrance at 7pm on the 8th of December. This service is another opportunity to pause and remember our loved ones at this special time of year.

Our next 8 week bereavement support course begins on January the 17th. Please call 07901 888 122 to reserve your place if you would like to attend.

Greener Christmas

This year, we are giving everyone the option of sending just one Christmas card to the fellowship at WBC by providing an attractive and dedicated board to display the cards. We will be using the 2 little Eco Church boards at the back of church and they will be ready for your cards from the beginning of December

How big is your environmental footprint?

We would like to encourage everyone at WBC to complete a personal or household 'carbon calculator'. These surveys help us to work out how much CO₂ we emit in different areas of our lives – travel, energy, lifestyle etc. The results can be surprising and will hopefully lead us all to reflect on how we can make more small changes to reduce our own carbon footprint and so have a positive impact on God's earth.

We have chosen to complete the World Wildlife Fund Footprint Calculator because it is quick and easy to complete and does not require us to give any personal information other than a postcode.

This will be just the 4th time we have been back in person since before the start of the covid pandemic as care homes were cautious about opening their doors to visitors. It has been a real delight to be so warmly welcomed and to meet face-toface with the residents and some of the staff after a year of services on zoom.

In September we held a Harvest Thanksgiving Service which was appreciated by many residents, their visitors and some care staff. We try to include something visual to make things attractive so the songsheets were illustrated with some of Vic's colourful pictures of creation and harvest which were also shown on the TV screen during the talk. One of the residents made a nice little thank you speech at the end!

I've been looking back at my notes for the services I have taken responsibility for since I took over from Christine nearly 3 years ago and realised that it will be 4 years since we last held a Carol Service at Windmill House. (There were several months, including December 2019, when there were no church services there due to changes in circumstances at the 3 churches which had been involved). Then after just one visit in Feb. 2020 the doors were closed to all visitors from March onwards. We started zoom services in May 2021 and continued every 2 months until May this year when we were finally able to go back in person. We had arranged to alternate with Wymondham Methodist Church throughout 2022 so there would be a service once a month but that has not happened for a several months.

It will be very special to be back at Windmill House to share a Carol Service this year. The whole house will be lavishly decorated and Fran Annis, the Wellbeing Lead, will have kept the residents busy and happy making things to be part of the display. Vic and Mary have family commitments and won't be able to accompany the carols so our son Matt has agreed to bring a keyboard and play for us. As we will be a smaller team than usual if there are 1 or 2 people who would like to join us please speak to me and I'll include you.

Our aim is always to be a blessing and an encouragement to everyone we meet when we visit Windmill House but we always come away feeling blessed and encouraged ourselves by the warm welcome we receive and the appreciation shown for this simple act of worship and service. Please pray for us as we prepare for and lead this service and spend time with the residents afterwards.

 - 3. Stir in caster sugar, ground almonds, grated marzipan and chopped dried fruit. Add zest of orange or lemon.
 - 4. Warm milk in a jug, don't make it really hot. Add lemon juice and allow to stand for 1-2 minutes it should curdle a little.
 - 5. Add the egg and almond extract to the milk mixture. Beat together so your egg is combined.
 - 6. Make a well in the middle of dry mixture. Pour in the milk/egg mixture and work it in using a metal fork or knife. Keep working it till it forms a sticky dough.
 - 7. Dust your hand and the surface with GF flour. Take a small amount of the dough and roll it in your hands into a slightly flattened ball. Place on prepared tray, leave gaps between each ball.
 - 8. Bake in the preheated oven for 12-15 minutes until golden.
 - 9. Remove from oven and allow to cool briefly on the tray before transferring to a cooling rack.
 - 10. Dust heavily with icing sugar and enjoy cold or slightly warm.

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

- It's read by a variety of people/voices from the 24-7 prayer team, including Pete Greig, author of a number of great books on prayer.



A message from Paul Smith, our Pastor at WBC.....




Home from Home -

A WORD FROM ROSEDALES

Christmas greetings from Sarah and Beverley- Bereavement Support Group facilitators at Rosedale.



2022 has been yet another very eventful year. We have had 3 Prime Ministers, a record breaking 70th Jubilee celebration followed by the death of our beloved monarch, a new King and war in Europe again. Our economy has been battered and bruised and families struggle to make ends meet.

For many families who have lost a loved one this year, 2022 will be a year they will never forget. Christmas can be yet another painful reminder of all that has been lost.

The build up to Christmas can be stressful and bring feelings of dread as we anticipate the empty space where our loved one should be.

I can imagine that the Royal family will find their Christmas this year is difficult and very different to what has gone before.

We are used to seeing the Queen's extended family gather together at Sandringham for Christmas and attend church on Christmas morning. We may not see that again as the New King decides to do things differently.

Often the older matriarch of a family has a way of bringing all members of the family together, perhaps organising a large collective celebration, carrying on familiar traditions, remembering what everyone likes to eat or gifts people like to receive. They can be like the glue that holds everyone together.

Of course, not everyone has an 'idyllic' Christmas or a family to share it with.

Christmas comes in all shapes, sizes and budgets. It is important to do what suits you at Christmas. There is no rule book.

This is also true with bereavement, there is no right or wrong way to grieve and timescales and intensity are unique to each person.

If you are bereaved, the following tips may help you decide how you want your Christmas to be this year:

- days instead.
- any people will understand.
- choose not to do this. However, others find this enables them to grieve, as they recall Christmases past.
- of real life no one should feel pressurised to feel 'jolly' at Christmas.
- Christmas movies portray happy loving families, beautifully (and expensively) decorated



 Some people find comfort in keeping their traditions the same- others find this is too painful and choose to do things very differently and invent new 'traditions' like going away for a few

• It can be painful signing just one name in Christmas cards so some people choose not to send

Putting up the usual tree and decorations can be loaded with difficult memories- some people

You may want to talk about your loved one at Christmas and include them as part of the celebration - raise a glass to them at lunch, celebrate the memories you shared together. Shedding a few tears is normal, healthy and shows you loved them. Tears and sadness are part

homes, snow on the ground and everyone getting along wonderfully. Most of us know this is pure fantasy! Take the pressure off yourself and do what is realistic and affordable instead.

- Throughout the Christmas period, spend some time alone if you need to. Go for a walk or run to relieve the pressure. Write in a journal about your thoughts and feelings.
- Some people choose to be alone on Christmas day and don't want the pressure of being around others. Others find that being around people can be a great distraction and support.
- If you cannot cope with parties this year, explain to the host that although you appreciate the invitation, you do not feel strong enough yet. On the other hand, you may find it comforting to be with others you can always leave early if it becomes overwhelming.

And finally, every year, Rosedale offers **Christmas candles** to anyone who is bereaved. At 11am on Christmas morning, we invite the lighting of the candle and time to pause and think about our loved one. Many others will be doing the same thing at the same time, so we know we are not alone in our grief. These are available now and can be collected from all the Rosedale branches in Norfolk and Suffolk - including Wymondham. Rosedale also holds Christmas services of remembrance in many towns in Norfolk and Suffolkcheck the Rosedale website for more details.

Wymondham Baptist Church and Rosedale work together to extend a warm welcome to anyone who has been bereaved, (no matter how long ago or which funeral director was used) to the Christmas Service of Remembrance at 7pm on the 8th of December. This service is another opportunity to pause and remember our loved ones at this special time of year.

Our next 8 week bereavement support course begins on January the 17th. Please call 07901 888 122 to reserve your place if you would like to attend.

Greener Christmas

How big is your environmental footprint?

We would like to encourage everyone at WBC to complete a personal or household 'carbon calculator'. These surveys help us to work out how much CO₂ we emit in different areas of our lives – travel, energy, lifestyle etc. The results can be surprising and will hopefully lead us all to reflect on how we can make more small changes to reduce our own carbon footprint and so have a positive impact on God's earth.

We have chosen to complete the World Wildlife Fund Footprint Calculator because it is quick and easy to complete and does not require us to give any personal information other than a postcode.

GLUTEN-FREE STOLLEN BITES

- 340 g gluten-free self raising flour
 ¼ tsp xanthan gum
 1 tsp gluten free baking powder
 85 g cold butter
 60 g caster sugar
 50 g ground almonds
 150 g marzipan grated
 100 g dried fruit chopped finely
 1 large egg
 150 ml milk
 3 tsp lemon juice
 2 tsp almond extract
 Zest of 1 lemon or orange
 lcing sugar for dusting
 - 1. Preheat Oven to 200C Fan/220C Prepare baking sheet with baking parchment

 - 9. Remove from oven and allow to cool briefly on the tray before transferring to a cooling rack.
 - 10. Dust heavily with icing sugar and enjoy cold or slightly warm.

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
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
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


Home from Home -

A WORD FROM ROSEDALES

Christmas greetings from Sarah and Beverley- Bereavement Support Group facilitators at Rosedale.



2022 has been yet another very eventful year. We have had 3 Prime Ministers, a record breaking 70th Jubilee celebration followed by the death of our beloved monarch, a new King and war in Europe again. Our economy has been battered and bruised and families struggle to make ends meet.

For many families who have lost a loved one this year, 2022 will be a year they will never forget. Christmas can be yet another painful reminder of all that has been lost.

The build up to Christmas can be stressful and bring feelings of dread as we anticipate the empty space where our loved one should be.

I can imagine that the Royal family will find their Christmas this year is difficult and very different to what has gone before.

We are used to seeing the Queen's extended family gather together at Sandringham for Christmas and attend church on Christmas morning. We may not see that again as the New King decides to do things differently.

Often the older matriarch of a family has a way of bringing all members of the family together, perhaps organising a large collective celebration, carrying on familiar traditions, remembering what everyone likes to eat or gifts people like to receive. They can be like the glue that holds everyone together.

Of course, not everyone has an 'idyllic' Christmas or a family to share it with.

Christmas comes in all shapes, sizes and budgets. It is important to do what suits you at Christmas. There is no rule book.

This is also true with bereavement, there is no right or wrong way to grieve and timescales and intensity are unique to each person.

If you are bereaved, the following tips may help you decide how you want your Christmas to be this year:

- days instead.
- any people will understand.
- choose not to do this. However, others find this enables them to grieve, as they recall Christmases past.
- of real life no one should feel pressurised to feel 'jolly' at Christmas.
- Christmas movies portray happy loving families, beautifully (and expensively) decorated



 Some people find comfort in keeping their traditions the same- others find this is too painful and choose to do things very differently and invent new 'traditions' like going away for a few

• It can be painful signing just one name in Christmas cards so some people choose not to send

Putting up the usual tree and decorations can be loaded with difficult memories- some people

You may want to talk about your loved one at Christmas and include them as part of the celebration - raise a glass to them at lunch, celebrate the memories you shared together. Shedding a few tears is normal, healthy and shows you loved them. Tears and sadness are part

homes, snow on the ground and everyone getting along wonderfully. Most of us know this is pure fantasy! Take the pressure off yourself and do what is realistic and affordable instead.

- Throughout the Christmas period, spend some time alone if you need to. Go for a walk or run to relieve the pressure. Write in a journal about your thoughts and feelings.
- Some people choose to be alone on Christmas day and don't want the pressure of being around others. Others find that being around people can be a great distraction and support.
- If you cannot cope with parties this year, explain to the host that although you appreciate the invitation, you do not feel strong enough yet. On the other hand, you may find it comforting to be with others you can always leave early if it becomes overwhelming.

And finally, every year, Rosedale offers **Christmas candles** to anyone who is bereaved. At 11am on Christmas morning, we invite the lighting of the candle and time to pause and think about our loved one. Many others will be doing the same thing at the same time, so we know we are not alone in our grief. These are available now and can be collected from all the Rosedale branches in Norfolk and Suffolk - including Wymondham. Rosedale also holds Christmas services of remembrance in many towns in Norfolk and Suffolkcheck the Rosedale website for more details.

Wymondham Baptist Church and Rosedale work together to extend a warm welcome to anyone who has been bereaved, (no matter how long ago or which funeral director was used) to the Christmas Service of Remembrance at 7pm on the 8th of December. This service is another opportunity to pause and remember our loved ones at this special time of year.

Our next 8 week bereavement support course begins on January the 17th. Please call 07901 888 122 to reserve your place if you would like to attend.

Greener Christmas

This year, we are giving everyone the option of sending just one Christmas card to the fellowship at WBC by providing an attractive and dedicated board to display the cards. All cards will be clearly and easily seen and will add to the festive appearance in the church. We will be using the 2 little Eco Church boards at the back of church and they will be ready for your cards from the beginning of December

How big is your environmental footprint?

We would like to encourage everyone at WBC to complete a personal or household 'carbon calculator'. These surveys help us to work out how much CO₂ we emit in different areas of our lives – travel, energy, lifestyle etc. The results can be surprising and will hopefully lead us all to reflect on how we can make more small changes to reduce our own carbon footprint and so have a positive impact on God's earth.

We have chosen to complete the World Wildlife Fund Footprint Calculator because it is quick and easy to complete and does not require us to give any personal information other than a postcode.

This will be just the 4th time we have been back in person since before the start of the covid pandemic as care homes were cautious about opening their doors to visitors. It has been a real delight to be so warmly welcomed and to meet face-toface with the residents and some of the staff after a year of services on zoom.

In September we held a Harvest Thanksgiving Service which was appreciated by many residents, their visitors and some care staff. We try to include something visual to make things attractive so the songsheets were illustrated with some of Vic's colourful pictures of creation and harvest which were also shown on the TV screen during the talk. One of the residents made a nice little thank you speech at the end!

I've been looking back at my notes for the services I have taken responsibility for since I took over from Christine nearly 3 years ago and realised that it will be 4 years since we last held a Carol Service at Windmill House. (There were several months, including December 2019, when there were no church services there due to changes in circumstances at the 3 churches which had been involved). Then after just one visit in Feb. 2020 the doors were closed to all visitors from March onwards. We started zoom services in May 2021 and continued every 2 months until May this year when we were finally able to go back in person. We had arranged to alternate with Wymondham Methodist Church throughout 2022 so there would be a service once a month but that has not happened for a several months.

It will be very special to be back at Windmill House to share a Carol Service this year. The whole house will be lavishly decorated and Fran Annis, the Wellbeing Lead, will have kept the residents busy and happy making things to be part of the display. Vic and Mary have family commitments and won't be able to accompany the carols so our son Matt has agreed to bring a keyboard and play for us. As we will be a smaller team than usual if there are 1 or 2 people who would like to join us please speak to me and I'll include you.

Our aim is always to be a blessing and an encouragement to everyone we meet when we visit Windmill House but we always come away feeling blessed and encouraged ourselves by the warm welcome we receive and the appreciation shown for this simple act of worship and service. Please pray for us as we prepare for and lead this service and spend time with the residents afterwards.

GLUTEN-FREE STOLLEN BITES

- 340 g gluten-free self raising flour
 ¼ tsp xanthan gum
 1 tsp gluten free baking powder
 85 g cold butter
 60 g caster sugar
 50 g ground almonds
 150 g marzipan grated
 100 g dried fruit chopped finely
 1 large egg
 150 ml milk
 3 tsp lemon juice
 2 tsp almond extract
 Zest of 1 lemon or orange
 lcing sugar for dusting
 - 1. Preheat Oven to 200C Fan/220C Prepare baking sheet with baking parchment
 - 2. Place GF self raising flour, baking powder and xanthan gum in a bowl. Chop cold butter into cubes and add to the flour. Rub in with your fingers until it forms what looks like breadcrumbs.
 - 3. Stir in caster sugar, ground almonds, grated marzipan and chopped dried fruit. Add zest of orange or lemon.
 - 4. Warm milk in a jug, don't make it really hot. Add lemon juice and allow to stand for 1-2 minutes it should curdle a little.
 - 5. Add the egg and almond extract to the milk mixture. Beat together so your egg is combined.
 - 6. Make a well in the middle of dry mixture. Pour in the milk/egg mixture and work it in using a metal fork or knife. Keep working it till it forms a sticky dough.
 - 7. Dust your hand and the surface with GF flour. Take a small amount of the dough and roll it in your hands into a slightly flattened ball. Place on prepared tray, leave gaps between each ball.
 - 8. Bake in the preheated oven for 12-15 minutes until golden.
 - 9. Remove from oven and allow to cool briefly on the tray before transferring to a cooling rack.
 - 10. Dust heavily with icing sugar and enjoy cold or slightly warm.

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
Lectio 365 is a free audio devotional app that helps you pray the Bible every day. Listen for 10 minutes each morning to meditate on the word and pray. End each day with God using peaceful, seasonal night prayers.

- It's short (10 minutes) and easy to fit it with morning routines.
- +tea in hand at the same time!
- to what's going on in the world at the time.
- It's read by a variety of people/voices from the 24-7 prayer team, including Pete Greig, author of a number of great books on prayer.


Things I find a challenge - Pete Greig usually reads the evening night prayers (5 - 6 mins) and his voice is so soothing that I can sometimes fall asleep before the end!



A WORD FROM ROSEDALES

Christmas greetings from Sarah and Beverley- Bereavement Support Group facilitators at Rosedale.



2022 has been yet another very eventful year. We have had 3 Prime Ministers, a record breaking 70th Jubilee celebration followed by the death of our beloved monarch, a new King and war in Europe again. Our economy has been battered and bruised and families struggle to make ends meet.

For many families who have lost a loved one this year, 2022 will be a year they will never forget. Christmas can be yet another painful reminder of all that has been lost.

The build up to Christmas can be stressful and bring feelings of dread as we anticipate the empty space where our loved one should be.

I can imagine that the Royal family will find their Christmas this year is difficult and very different to what has gone before.

We are used to seeing the Queen's extended family gather together at Sandringham for Christmas and attend church on Christmas morning. We may not see that again as the New King decides to do things differently.

Often the older matriarch of a family has a way of bringing all members of the family together, perhaps organising a large collective celebration, carrying on familiar traditions, remembering what everyone likes to eat or gifts people like to receive. They can be like the glue that holds everyone together.

Of course, not everyone has an 'idyllic' Christmas or a family to share it with.

Christmas comes in all shapes, sizes and budgets. It is important to do what suits you at Christmas. There is no rule book.

This is also true with bereavement, there is no right or wrong way to grieve and timescales and intensity are unique to each person.

If you are bereaved, the following tips may help you decide how you want your Christmas to be this year:

- days instead.
- any people will understand.
- choose not to do this. However, others find this enables them to grieve, as they recall Christmases past.
- of real life no one should feel pressurised to feel 'jolly' at Christmas.
- Christmas movies portray happy loving families, beautifully (and expensively) decorated



 Some people find comfort in keeping their traditions the same- others find this is too painful and choose to do things very differently and invent new 'traditions' like going away for a few

• It can be painful signing just one name in Christmas cards so some people choose not to send

Putting up the usual tree and decorations can be loaded with difficult memories- some people

You may want to talk about your loved one at Christmas and include them as part of the celebration - raise a glass to them at lunch, celebrate the memories you shared together. Shedding a few tears is normal, healthy and shows you loved them. Tears and sadness are part

homes, snow on the ground and everyone getting along wonderfully. Most of us know this is pure fantasy! Take the pressure off yourself and do what is realistic and affordable instead.

- Throughout the Christmas period, spend some time alone if you need to. Go for a walk or run to relieve the pressure. Write in a journal about your thoughts and feelings.
- Some people choose to be alone on Christmas day and don't want the pressure of being around others. Others find that being around people can be a great distraction and support.
- If you cannot cope with parties this year, explain to the host that although you appreciate the invitation, you do not feel strong enough yet. On the other hand, you may find it comforting to be with others you can always leave early if it becomes overwhelming.

And finally, every year, Rosedale offers **Christmas candles** to anyone who is bereaved. At 11am on Christmas morning, we invite the lighting of the candle and time to pause and think about our loved one. Many others will be doing the same thing at the same time, so we know we are not alone in our grief. These are available now and can be collected from all the Rosedale branches in Norfolk and Suffolk - including Wymondham. Rosedale also holds Christmas services of remembrance in many towns in Norfolk and Suffolkcheck the Rosedale website for more details.

Wymondham Baptist Church and Rosedale work together to extend a warm welcome to anyone who has been bereaved, (no matter how long ago or which funeral director was used) to the Christmas Service of Remembrance at 7pm on the 8th of December. This service is another opportunity to pause and remember our loved ones at this special time of year.

Our next 8 week bereavement support course begins on January the 17th. Please call 07901 888 122 to reserve your place if you would like to attend.

Greener Christmas

We would like to encourage everyone at WBC to complete a personal or household 'carbon calculator'. These surveys help us to work out how much CO₂ we emit in different areas of our lives – travel, energy, lifestyle etc. The results can be surprising and will hopefully lead us all to reflect on how we can make more small changes to reduce our own carbon footprint and so have a positive impact on God's earth.

(There were several months, including December 2019, when there were no church services there due to changes in circumstances at the 3 churches which had been involved). Then after just one visit in Feb. 2020 the doors were closed to all visitors from March onwards. We started zoom services in May 2021 and continued every 2 months until May this year when we were finally able to go back in person. We had arranged to alternate with Wymondham Methodist Church throughout 2022 so there would be a service once a month but that has not happened for a several months.

It will be very special to be back at Windmill House to share a Carol Service this year. The whole house will be lavishly decorated and Fran Annis, the Wellbeing Lead, will have kept the residents busy and happy making things to be part of the display. Vic and Mary have family commitments and won't be able to accompany the carols so our son Matt has agreed to bring a keyboard and play for us. As we will be a smaller team than usual if there are 1 or 2 people who would like to join us please speak to me and I'll include you.

Our aim is always to be a blessing and an encouragement to everyone we meet when we visit Windmill House but we always come away feeling blessed and encouraged ourselves by the warm welcome we receive and the appreciation shown for this simple act of worship and service. Please pray for us as we prepare for and lead this service and spend time with the residents afterwards.

GLUTEN-FREE STOLLEN BITES

- 340 g gluten-free self raising flour
 ¼ tsp xanthan gum
 1 tsp gluten free baking powder
 85 g cold butter
 60 g caster sugar
 50 g ground almonds
 150 g marzipan grated
 100 g dried fruit chopped finely
 1 large egg
 150 ml milk
 3 tsp lemon juice
 2 tsp almond extract
 Zest of 1 lemon or orange
 lcing sugar for dusting
 - 1. Preheat Oven to 200C Fan/220C Prepare baking sheet with baking parchment
 - 2. Place GF self raising flour, baking powder and xanthan gum in a bowl. Chop cold butter into cubes and add to the flour. Rub in with your fingers until it forms what looks like breadcrumbs.
 - 3. Stir in caster sugar, ground almonds, grated marzipan and chopped dried fruit. Add zest of orange or lemon.
 - 4. Warm milk in a jug, don't make it really hot. Add lemon juice and allow to stand for 1-2 minutes it should curdle a little.
 - 5. Add the egg and almond extract to the milk mixture. Beat together so your egg is combined.
 - 6. Make a well in the middle of dry mixture. Pour in the milk/egg mixture and work it in using a metal fork or knife. Keep working it till it forms a sticky dough.
 - 7. Dust your hand and the surface with GF flour. Take a small amount of the dough and roll it in your hands into a slightly flattened ball. Place on prepared tray, leave gaps between each ball.
 - 8. Bake in the preheated oven for 12-15 minutes until golden.
 - 9. Remove from oven and allow to cool briefly on the tray before transferring to a cooling rack.
 - 10. Dust heavily with icing sugar and enjoy cold or slightly warm.

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

- It's read by a variety of people/voices from the 24-7 prayer team, including Pete Greig, author of a number of great books on prayer.






Home from Home -

A WORD FROM ROSEDALES

Christmas greetings from Sarah and Beverley- Bereavement Support Group facilitators at Rosedale.



2022 has been yet another very eventful year. We have had 3 Prime Ministers, a record breaking 70th Jubilee celebration followed by the death of our beloved monarch, a new King and war in Europe again. Our economy has been battered and bruised and families struggle to make ends meet.

For many families who have lost a loved one this year, 2022 will be a year they will never forget. Christmas can be yet another painful reminder of all that has been lost.

The build up to Christmas can be stressful and bring feelings of dread as we anticipate the empty space where our loved one should be.

I can imagine that the Royal family will find their Christmas this year is difficult and very different to what has gone before.

We are used to seeing the Queen's extended family gather together at Sandringham for Christmas and attend church on Christmas morning. We may not see that again as the New King decides to do things differently.

Often the older matriarch of a family has a way of bringing all members of the family together, perhaps organising a large collective celebration, carrying on familiar traditions, remembering what everyone likes to eat or gifts people like to receive. They can be like the glue that holds everyone together.

Of course, not everyone has an 'idyllic' Christmas or a family to share it with.

Christmas comes in all shapes, sizes and budgets. It is important to do what suits you at Christmas. There is no rule book.

This is also true with bereavement, there is no right or wrong way to grieve and timescales and intensity are unique to each person.

If you are bereaved, the following tips may help you decide how you want your Christmas to be this year:

- days instead.
- any people will understand.
- choose not to do this. However, others find this enables them to grieve, as they recall Christmases past.
- of real life no one should feel pressurised to feel 'jolly' at Christmas.
- Christmas movies portray happy loving families, beautifully (and expensively) decorated



 Some people find comfort in keeping their traditions the same- others find this is too painful and choose to do things very differently and invent new 'traditions' like going away for a few

• It can be painful signing just one name in Christmas cards so some people choose not to send

Putting up the usual tree and decorations can be loaded with difficult memories- some people

You may want to talk about your loved one at Christmas and include them as part of the celebration - raise a glass to them at lunch, celebrate the memories you shared together. Shedding a few tears is normal, healthy and shows you loved them. Tears and sadness are part

homes, snow on the ground and everyone getting along wonderfully. Most of us know this is pure fantasy! Take the pressure off yourself and do what is realistic and affordable instead.

- Throughout the Christmas period, spend some time alone if you need to. Go for a walk or run to relieve the pressure. Write in a journal about your thoughts and feelings.
- Some people choose to be alone on Christmas day and don't want the pressure of being around others. Others find that being around people can be a great distraction and support.
- If you cannot cope with parties this year, explain to the host that although you appreciate the invitation, you do not feel strong enough yet. On the other hand, you may find it comforting to be with others you can always leave early if it becomes overwhelming.

And finally, every year, Rosedale offers **Christmas candles** to anyone who is bereaved. At 11am on Christmas morning, we invite the lighting of the candle and time to pause and think about our loved one. Many others will be doing the same thing at the same time, so we know we are not alone in our grief. These are available now and can be collected from all the Rosedale branches in Norfolk and Suffolk - including Wymondham. Rosedale also holds Christmas services of remembrance in many towns in Norfolk and Suffolkcheck the Rosedale website for more details.

Wymondham Baptist Church and Rosedale work together to extend a warm welcome to anyone who has been bereaved, (no matter how long ago or which funeral director was used) to the Christmas Service of Remembrance at 7pm on the 8th of December. This service is another opportunity to pause and remember our loved ones at this special time of year.

Greener Christmas

GLUTEN-FREE STOLLEN BITES

- 340 g gluten-free self raising flour
 ¼ tsp xanthan gum
 1 tsp gluten free baking powder
 85 g cold butter
 60 g caster sugar
 50 g ground almonds
 150 g marzipan grated
 100 g dried fruit chopped finely
 1 large egg
 150 ml milk
 3 tsp lemon juice
 2 tsp almond extract
 Zest of 1 lemon or orange
 lcing sugar for dusting
 - 1. Preheat Oven to 200C Fan/220C Prepare baking sheet with baking parchment
 - 2. Place GF self raising flour, baking powder and xanthan gum in a bowl. Chop cold butter into cubes and add to the flour. Rub in with your fingers until it forms what looks like breadcrumbs.
 - 3. Stir in caster sugar, ground almonds, grated marzipan and chopped dried fruit. Add zest of orange or lemon.
 - 4. Warm milk in a jug, don't make it really hot. Add lemon juice and allow to stand for 1-2 minutes it should curdle a little.
 - 5. Add the egg and almond extract to the milk mixture. Beat together so your egg is combined.
 - 6. Make a well in the middle of dry mixture. Pour in the milk/egg mixture and work it in using a metal fork or knife. Keep working it till it forms a sticky dough.
 - 7. Dust your hand and the surface with GF flour. Take a small amount of the dough and roll it in your hands into a slightly flattened ball. Place on prepared tray, leave gaps between each ball.
 - 8. Bake in the preheated oven for 12-15 minutes until golden.
 - 9. Remove from oven and allow to cool briefly on the tray before transferring to a cooling rack.
 - 10. Dust heavily with icing sugar and enjoy cold or slightly warm.



- It's read by a variety of people/voices from the 24-7 prayer team, including Pete Greig, author of a number of great books on prayer.






Home from Home -

A WORD FROM ROSEDALES

Christmas greetings from Sarah and Beverley- Bereavement Support Group facilitators at Rosedale.



2022 has been yet another very eventful year. We have had 3 Prime Ministers, a record breaking 70th Jubilee celebration followed by the death of our beloved monarch, a new King and war in Europe again. Our economy has been battered and bruised and families struggle to make ends meet.

For many families who have lost a loved one this year, 2022 will be a year they will never forget. Christmas can be yet another painful reminder of all that has been lost.

The build up to Christmas can be stressful and bring feelings of dread as we anticipate the empty space where our loved one should be.

I can imagine that the Royal family will find their Christmas this year is difficult and very different to what has gone before.

We are used to seeing the Queen's extended family gather together at Sandringham for Christmas and attend church on Christmas morning. We may not see that again as the New King decides to do things differently.

Often the older matriarch of a family has a way of bringing all members of the family together, perhaps organising a large collective celebration, carrying on familiar traditions, remembering what everyone likes to eat or gifts people like to receive. They can be like the glue that holds everyone together.

Of course, not everyone has an 'idyllic' Christmas or a family to share it with.

Christmas comes in all shapes, sizes and budgets. It is important to do what suits you at Christmas. There is no rule book.

This is also true with bereavement, there is no right or wrong way to grieve and timescales and intensity are unique to each person.

If you are bereaved, the following tips may help you decide how you want your Christmas to be this year:

- days instead.
- any people will understand.
- choose not to do this. However, others find this enables them to grieve, as they recall Christmases past.
- of real life no one should feel pressurised to feel 'jolly' at Christmas.
- Christmas movies portray happy loving families, beautifully (and expensively) decorated



 Some people find comfort in keeping their traditions the same- others find this is too painful and choose to do things very differently and invent new 'traditions' like going away for a few

• It can be painful signing just one name in Christmas cards so some people choose not to send

Putting up the usual tree and decorations can be loaded with difficult memories- some people

You may want to talk about your loved one at Christmas and include them as part of the celebration - raise a glass to them at lunch, celebrate the memories you shared together. Shedding a few tears is normal, healthy and shows you loved them. Tears and sadness are part

homes, snow on the ground and everyone getting along wonderfully. Most of us know this is pure fantasy! Take the pressure off yourself and do what is realistic and affordable instead.

- Throughout the Christmas period, spend some time alone if you need to. Go for a walk or run to relieve the pressure. Write in a journal about your thoughts and feelings.
- Some people choose to be alone on Christmas day and don't want the pressure of being around others. Others find that being around people can be a great distraction and support.
- If you cannot cope with parties this year, explain to the host that although you appreciate the invitation, you do not feel strong enough yet. On the other hand, you may find it comforting to be with others you can always leave early if it becomes overwhelming.

And finally, every year, Rosedale offers **Christmas candles** to anyone who is bereaved. At 11am on Christmas morning, we invite the lighting of the candle and time to pause and think about our loved one. Many others will be doing the same thing at the same time, so we know we are not alone in our grief. These are available now and can be collected from all the Rosedale branches in Norfolk and Suffolk - including Wymondham. Rosedale also holds Christmas services of remembrance in many towns in Norfolk and Suffolkcheck the Rosedale website for more details.

Wymondham Baptist Church and Rosedale work together to extend a warm welcome to anyone who has been bereaved, (no matter how long ago or which funeral director was used) to the Christmas Service of Remembrance at 7pm on the 8th of December. This service is another opportunity to pause and remember our loved ones at this special time of year.

Our next 8 week bereavement support course begins on January the 17th. Please call 07901 888 122 to reserve your place if you would like to attend.

Greener Christmas

GLUTEN-FREE STOLLEN BITES

- 340 g gluten-free self raising flour
 ¼ tsp xanthan gum
 1 tsp gluten free baking powder
 85 g cold butter
 60 g caster sugar
 50 g ground almonds
 150 g marzipan grated
 100 g dried fruit chopped finely
 1 large egg
 150 ml milk
 3 tsp lemon juice
 2 tsp almond extract
 Zest of 1 lemon or orange
 lcing sugar for dusting
 - 1. Preheat Oven to 200C Fan/220C Prepare baking sheet with baking parchment
 - 2. Place GF self raising flour, baking powder and xanthan gum in a bowl. Chop cold butter into cubes and add to the flour. Rub in with your fingers until it forms what looks like breadcrumbs.
 - 3. Stir in caster sugar, ground almonds, grated marzipan and chopped dried fruit. Add zest of orange or lemon.
 - 4. Warm milk in a jug, don't make it really hot. Add lemon juice and allow to stand for 1-2 minutes it should curdle a little.
 - 5. Add the egg and almond extract to the milk mixture. Beat together so your egg is combined.
 - 6. Make a well in the middle of dry mixture. Pour in the milk/egg mixture and work it in using a metal fork or knife. Keep working it till it forms a sticky dough.
 - 7. Dust your hand and the surface with GF flour. Take a small amount of the dough and roll it in your hands into a slightly flattened ball. Place on prepared tray, leave gaps between each ball.
 - 8. Bake in the preheated oven for 12-15 minutes until golden.
 - 9. Remove from oven and allow to cool briefly on the tray before transferring to a cooling rack.
 - 10. Dust heavily with icing sugar and enjoy cold or slightly warm.

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

- It's read by a variety of people/voices from the 24-7 prayer team, including Pete Greig, author of a number of great books on prayer.






Home from Home -

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For many families who have lost a loved one this year, 2022 will be a year they will never forget. Christmas can be yet another painful reminder of all that has been lost.

The build up to Christmas can be stressful and bring feelings of dread as we anticipate the empty space where our loved one should be.

I can imagine that the Royal family will find their Christmas this year is difficult and very different to what has gone before.

We are used to seeing the Queen's extended family gather together at Sandringham for Christmas and attend church on Christmas morning. We may not see that again as the New King decides to do things differently.

Often the older matriarch of a family has a way of bringing all members of the family together, perhaps organising a large collective celebration, carrying on familiar traditions, remembering what everyone likes to eat or gifts people like to receive. They can be like the glue that holds everyone together.

Of course, not everyone has an 'idyllic' Christmas or a family to share it with.

Christmas comes in all shapes, sizes and budgets. It is important to do what suits you at Christmas. There is no rule book.

This is also true with bereavement, there is no right or wrong way to grieve and timescales and intensity are unique to each person.

If you are bereaved, the following tips may help you decide how you want your Christmas to be this year:

- days instead.

- choose not to do this. However, others find this enables them to grieve, as they recall Christmases past.
- of real life no one should feel pressurised to feel 'jolly' at Christmas.
- Christmas movies portray happy loving families, beautifully (and expensively) decorated



 Some people find comfort in keeping their traditions the same- others find this is too painful and choose to do things very differently and invent new 'traditions' like going away for a few

• It can be painful signing just one name in Christmas cards so some people choose not to send

Putting up the usual tree and decorations can be loaded with difficult memories- some people

You may want to talk about your loved one at Christmas and include them as part of the celebration - raise a glass to them at lunch, celebrate the memories you shared together. Shedding a few tears is normal, healthy and shows you loved them. Tears and sadness are part

homes, snow on the ground and everyone getting along wonderfully. Most of us know this is pure fantasy! Take the pressure off yourself and do what is realistic and affordable instead.

- Throughout the Christmas period, spend some time alone if you need to. Go for a walk or run to relieve the pressure. Write in a journal about your thoughts and feelings.
- Some people choose to be alone on Christmas day and don't want the pressure of being around others. Others find that being around people can be a great distraction and support.
- If you cannot cope with parties this year, explain to the host that although you appreciate the invitation, you do not feel strong enough yet. On the other hand, you may find it comforting to be with others you can always leave early if it becomes overwhelming.

And finally, every year, Rosedale offers **Christmas candles** to anyone who is bereaved. At 11am on Christmas morning, we invite the lighting of the candle and time to pause and think about our loved one. Many others will be doing the same thing at the same time, so we know we are not alone in our grief. These are available now and can be collected from all the Rosedale branches in Norfolk and Suffolk - including Wymondham. Rosedale also holds Christmas services of remembrance in many towns in Norfolk and Suffolkcheck the Rosedale website for more details.

Wymondham Baptist Church and Rosedale work together to extend a warm welcome to anyone who has been bereaved, (no matter how long ago or which funeral director was used) to the Christmas Service of Remembrance at 7pm on the 8th of December. This service is another opportunity to pause and remember our loved ones at this special time of year.

Greener Christmas

GLUTEN-FREE STOLLEN BITES

- 340 g gluten-free self raising flour
 ¼ tsp xanthan gum
 1 tsp gluten free baking powder
 85 g cold butter
 60 g caster sugar
 50 g ground almonds
 150 g marzipan grated
 100 g dried fruit chopped finely
 1 large egg
 150 ml milk
 3 tsp lemon juice
 2 tsp almond extract
 Zest of 1 lemon or orange
 lcing sugar for dusting
 - 1. Preheat Oven to 200C Fan/220C Prepare baking sheet with baking parchment
 - 2. Place GF self raising flour, baking powder and xanthan gum in a bowl. Chop cold butter into cubes and add to the flour. Rub in with your fingers until it forms what looks like breadcrumbs.
 - 3. Stir in caster sugar, ground almonds, grated marzipan and chopped dried fruit. Add zest of orange or lemon.
 - 4. Warm milk in a jug, don't make it really hot. Add lemon juice and allow to stand for 1-2 minutes it should curdle a little.
 - 5. Add the egg and almond extract to the milk mixture. Beat together so your egg is combined.
 - 6. Make a well in the middle of dry mixture. Pour in the milk/egg mixture and work it in using a metal fork or knife. Keep working it till it forms a sticky dough.
 - 7. Dust your hand and the surface with GF flour. Take a small amount of the dough and roll it in your hands into a slightly flattened ball. Place on prepared tray, leave gaps between each ball.
 - 8. Bake in the preheated oven for 12-15 minutes until golden.
 - 9. Remove from oven and allow to cool briefly on the tray before transferring to a cooling rack.
 - 10. Dust heavily with icing sugar and enjoy cold or slightly warm.

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

- It's read by a variety of people/voices from the 24-7 prayer team, including Pete Greig, author of a number of great books on prayer.






Home from Home -

'Shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth. Worship the Lord with gladness; come before him with joyful songs. Know that the Lord is God. It is he who has made us, and we are his; we are his people, the sheep of his pasture.

Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise; give thanks to him and praise his name. For the Lord is good and his love endures for ever; his faithfulness continues through all generations.'

This is my favourite Psalm as, although it is short, it contains the essence of much of what I believe to be true about God and so how we should praise Him, thank Him and value all other people.

I believe that as a Christian I should try to be joyful all the time - not always possible, sad to say. When I see something wonderful I try to praise and thank God for it. And I should always remember that, if I believe, as I do, that He made me and loves me, then He made every other person and loves them as much too. (That is ALL people, even those people I fundamentally disagree with!). This is one of the reasons why I feel so comfortable in the 'All inclusive' Wymondham Baptist Church. For me the Psalm also reinforces the knowledge that God's love endures always and for every generation.

When I read this Psalm I am reminded of the lovely worship song, which I really enjoy singing, 'Jubilate, everybody, serve the Lord in all your ways':

Jubilate, everybody

Jubilate, everybody, serve the Lord in all your ways, and come before His presence singing: enter now His courts with praise. For the Lord our God is gracious. and His mercy's everlasting. Jubilate, jubilate, jubilate Deo!

A WORD FROM ROSEDALES

Christmas greetings from Sarah and Beverley- Bereavement Support Group facilitators at Rosedale.



2022 has been yet another very eventful year. We have had 3 Prime Ministers, a record breaking 70th Jubilee celebration followed by the death of our beloved monarch, a new King and war in Europe again. Our economy has been battered and bruised and families struggle to make ends meet.

For many families who have lost a loved one this year, 2022 will be a year they will never forget. Christmas can be yet another painful reminder of all that has been lost.

The build up to Christmas can be stressful and bring feelings of dread as we anticipate the empty space where our loved one should be.

I can imagine that the Royal family will find their Christmas this year is difficult and very different to what has gone before.

We are used to seeing the Queen's extended family gather together at Sandringham for Christmas and attend church on Christmas morning. We may not see that again as the New King decides to do things differently.

Often the older matriarch of a family has a way of bringing all members of the family together, perhaps organising a large collective celebration, carrying on familiar traditions, remembering what everyone likes to eat or gifts people like to receive. They can be like the glue that holds everyone together.

Of course, not everyone has an 'idyllic' Christmas or a family to share it with.

Christmas comes in all shapes, sizes and budgets. It is important to do what suits you at Christmas. There is no rule book.

This is also true with bereavement, there is no right or wrong way to grieve and timescales and intensity are unique to each person.

If you are bereaved, the following tips may help you decide how you want your Christmas to be this year:

- days instead.
- any people will understand.
- choose not to do this. However, others find this enables them to grieve, as they recall Christmases past.
- of real life no one should feel pressurised to feel 'jolly' at Christmas.
- Christmas movies portray happy loving families, beautifully (and expensively) decorated



 Some people find comfort in keeping their traditions the same- others find this is too painful and choose to do things very differently and invent new 'traditions' like going away for a few

• It can be painful signing just one name in Christmas cards so some people choose not to send

Putting up the usual tree and decorations can be loaded with difficult memories- some people

You may want to talk about your loved one at Christmas and include them as part of the celebration - raise a glass to them at lunch, celebrate the memories you shared together. Shedding a few tears is normal, healthy and shows you loved them. Tears and sadness are part

homes, snow on the ground and everyone getting along wonderfully. Most of us know this is pure fantasy! Take the pressure off yourself and do what is realistic and affordable instead.

- Throughout the Christmas period, spend some time alone if you need to. Go for a walk or run to relieve the pressure. Write in a journal about your thoughts and feelings.
- Some people choose to be alone on Christmas day and don't want the pressure of being around others. Others find that being around people can be a great distraction and support.
- If you cannot cope with parties this year, explain to the host that although you appreciate the invitation, you do not feel strong enough yet. On the other hand, you may find it comforting to be with others you can always leave early if it becomes overwhelming.

And finally, every year, Rosedale offers **Christmas candles** to anyone who is bereaved. At 11am on Christmas morning, we invite the lighting of the candle and time to pause and think about our loved one. Many others will be doing the same thing at the same time, so we know we are not alone in our grief. These are available now and can be collected from all the Rosedale branches in Norfolk and Suffolk - including Wymondham. Rosedale also holds Christmas services of remembrance in many towns in Norfolk and Suffolkcheck the Rosedale website for more details.

Wymondham Baptist Church and Rosedale work together to extend a warm welcome to anyone who has been bereaved, (no matter how long ago or which funeral director was used) to the Christmas Service of Remembrance at 7pm on the 8th of December. This service is another opportunity to pause and remember our loved ones at this special time of year.

Our next 8 week bereavement support course begins on January the 17th. Please call 07901 888 122 to reserve your place if you would like to attend.

Greener Christmas

This year, we are giving everyone the option of sending just one Christmas card to the fellowship at WBC by providing an attractive and dedicated board to display the cards. All cards will be clearly and easily seen and will add to the festive appearance in the church. We will be using the 2 little Eco Church boards at the back of church and they will be ready for your cards from the beginning of December

How big is your environmental footprint?

We would like to encourage everyone at WBC to complete a personal or household 'carbon calculator'. These surveys help us to work out how much CO₂ we emit in different areas of our lives – travel, energy, lifestyle etc. The results can be surprising and will hopefully lead us all to reflect on how we can make more small changes to reduce our own carbon footprint and so have a positive impact on God's earth.

We have chosen to complete the World Wildlife Fund Footprint Calculator because it is quick and easy to complete and does not require us to give any personal information other than a postcode.

On Wednesday 14th December a team of us from WBC will be leading a Carol Service at Windmill House Care Home. This will be just the 4th time we have been back in person since before the start of the covid pandemic as care homes were cautious about opening their doors to visitors. It has been a real delight to be so warmly welcomed and to meet face-toface with the residents and some of the staff after a year of services on zoom.

In September we held a Harvest Thanksgiving Service which was appreciated by many residents, their visitors and some care staff. We try to include something visual to make things attractive so the songsheets were illustrated with some of Vic's colourful pictures of creation and harvest which were also shown on the TV screen during the talk. One of the residents made a nice little thank you speech at the end!

I've been looking back at my notes for the services I have taken responsibility for since I took over from Christine nearly 3 years ago and realised that it will be 4 years since we last held a Carol Service at Windmill House. (There were several months, including December 2019, when there were no church services there due to changes in circumstances at the 3 churches which had been involved). Then after just one visit in Feb. 2020 the doors were closed to all visitors from March onwards. We started zoom services in May 2021 and continued every 2 months until May this year when we were finally able to go back in person. We had arranged to alternate with Wymondham Methodist Church throughout 2022 so there would be a service once a month but that has not happened for a several months.

It will be very special to be back at Windmill House to share a Carol Service this year. The whole house will be lavishly decorated and Fran Annis, the Wellbeing Lead, will have kept the residents busy and happy making things to be part of the display. Vic and Mary have family commitments and won't be able to accompany the carols so our son Matt has agreed to bring a keyboard and play for us. As we will be a smaller team than usual if there are 1 or 2 people who would like to join us please speak to me and I'll include you.

Our aim is always to be a blessing and an encouragement to everyone we meet when we visit Windmill House but we always come away feeling blessed and encouraged ourselves by the warm welcome we receive and the appreciation shown for this simple act of worship and service. Please pray for us as we prepare for and lead this service and spend time with the residents afterwards.

GLUTEN-FREE STOLLEN BITES

- 340 g gluten-free self raising flour
 ¼ tsp xanthan gum
 1 tsp gluten free baking powder
 85 g cold butter
 60 g caster sugar
 50 g ground almonds
 150 g marzipan grated
 100 g dried fruit chopped finely
 1 large egg
 150 ml milk
 3 tsp lemon juice
 2 tsp almond extract
 Zest of 1 lemon or orange
 lcing sugar for dusting
 - 1. Preheat Oven to 200C Fan/220C Prepare baking sheet with baking parchment
 - 2. Place GF self raising flour, baking powder and xanthan gum in a bowl. Chop cold butter into cubes and add to the flour. Rub in with your fingers until it forms what looks like breadcrumbs.
 - 3. Stir in caster sugar, ground almonds, grated marzipan and chopped dried fruit. Add zest of orange or lemon.
 - 4. Warm milk in a jug, don't make it really hot. Add lemon juice and allow to stand for 1-2 minutes it should curdle a little.
 - 5. Add the egg and almond extract to the milk mixture. Beat together so your egg is combined.
 - 6. Make a well in the middle of dry mixture. Pour in the milk/egg mixture and work it in using a metal fork or knife. Keep working it till it forms a sticky dough.
 - 7. Dust your hand and the surface with GF flour. Take a small amount of the dough and roll it in your hands into a slightly flattened ball. Place on prepared tray, leave gaps between each ball.
 - 8. Bake in the preheated oven for 12-15 minutes until golden.
 - 9. Remove from oven and allow to cool briefly on the tray before transferring to a cooling rack.
 - 10. Dust heavily with icing sugar and enjoy cold or slightly warm.



- It's read by a variety of people/voices from the 24-7 prayer team, including Pete Greig, author of a number of great books on prayer.






Home from Home -

And I should always remember that, if I believe, as I do, that He made me and loves me, then He made every other person and loves them as much too. (That is ALL people, even those people I fundamentally disagree with!). This is one of the reasons why I feel so comfortable in the 'All inclusive' Wymondham Baptist Church. For me the Psalm also reinforces the knowledge that God's love endures always and for every generation.

When I read this Psalm I am reminded of the lovely worship song, which I really enjoy singing, 'Jubilate, everybody, serve the Lord in all your ways':

A WORD FROM ROSEDALES

Christmas greetings from Sarah and Beverley- Bereavement Support Group facilitators at Rosedale.



2022 has been yet another very eventful year. We have had 3 Prime Ministers, a record breaking 70th Jubilee celebration followed by the death of our beloved monarch, a new King and war in Europe again. Our economy has been battered and bruised and families struggle to make ends meet.

For many families who have lost a loved one this year, 2022 will be a year they will never forget. Christmas can be yet another painful reminder of all that has been lost.

The build up to Christmas can be stressful and bring feelings of dread as we anticipate the empty space where our loved one should be.

I can imagine that the Royal family will find their Christmas this year is difficult and very different to what has gone before.

We are used to seeing the Queen's extended family gather together at Sandringham for Christmas and attend church on Christmas morning. We may not see that again as the New King decides to do things differently.

Often the older matriarch of a family has a way of bringing all members of the family together, perhaps organising a large collective celebration, carrying on familiar traditions, remembering what everyone likes to eat or gifts people like to receive. They can be like the glue that holds everyone together.

Of course, not everyone has an 'idyllic' Christmas or a family to share it with.

Christmas comes in all shapes, sizes and budgets. It is important to do what suits you at Christmas. There is no rule book.

This is also true with bereavement, there is no right or wrong way to grieve and timescales and intensity are unique to each person.

If you are bereaved, the following tips may help you decide how you want your Christmas to be this year:

- days instead.
- any people will understand.
- choose not to do this. However, others find this enables them to grieve, as they recall Christmases past.
- of real life no one should feel pressurised to feel 'jolly' at Christmas.
- Christmas movies portray happy loving families, beautifully (and expensively) decorated



 Some people find comfort in keeping their traditions the same- others find this is too painful and choose to do things very differently and invent new 'traditions' like going away for a few

• It can be painful signing just one name in Christmas cards so some people choose not to send

Putting up the usual tree and decorations can be loaded with difficult memories- some people

You may want to talk about your loved one at Christmas and include them as part of the celebration - raise a glass to them at lunch, celebrate the memories you shared together. Shedding a few tears is normal, healthy and shows you loved them. Tears and sadness are part

homes, snow on the ground and everyone getting along wonderfully. Most of us know this is pure fantasy! Take the pressure off yourself and do what is realistic and affordable instead.

- Throughout the Christmas period, spend some time alone if you need to. Go for a walk or run to relieve the pressure. Write in a journal about your thoughts and feelings.
- Some people choose to be alone on Christmas day and don't want the pressure of being around others. Others find that being around people can be a great distraction and support.
- If you cannot cope with parties this year, explain to the host that although you appreciate the invitation, you do not feel strong enough yet. On the other hand, you may find it comforting to be with others you can always leave early if it becomes overwhelming.

And finally, every year, Rosedale offers **Christmas candles** to anyone who is bereaved. At 11am on Christmas morning, we invite the lighting of the candle and time to pause and think about our loved one. Many others will be doing the same thing at the same time, so we know we are not alone in our grief. These are available now and can be collected from all the Rosedale branches in Norfolk and Suffolk - including Wymondham. Rosedale also holds Christmas services of remembrance in many towns in Norfolk and Suffolkcheck the Rosedale website for more details.

Wymondham Baptist Church and Rosedale work together to extend a warm welcome to anyone who has been bereaved, (no matter how long ago or which funeral director was used) to the Christmas Service of Remembrance at 7pm on the 8th of December. This service is another opportunity to pause and remember our loved ones at this special time of year.

Greener Christmas

This year, we are giving everyone the option of sending just one Christmas card to the fellowship at WBC by providing an attractive and dedicated board to display the cards. How big is your environmental footprint?

We would like to encourage everyone at WBC to complete a personal or household 'carbon calculator'. These surveys help us to work out how much CO₂ we emit in different areas of our lives – travel, energy, lifestyle etc. The results can be surprising and will hopefully lead us all to reflect on how we can make more small changes to reduce our own carbon footprint and so have a positive impact on God's earth.

We have chosen to complete the World Wildlife Fund Footprint Calculator because it is quick and easy to complete and does not require us to give any personal information other than a postcode.

On Wednesday 14th December a team of us from WBC will be leading a Carol Service at Windmill House Care Home. This will be just the 4th time we have been back in person since before the start of the covid pandemic as care homes were cautious about opening their doors to visitors. It has been a real delight to be so warmly welcomed and to meet face-toface with the residents and some of the staff after a year of services on zoom.

In September we held a Harvest Thanksgiving Service which was appreciated by many residents, their visitors and some care staff. We try to include something visual to make things attractive so the songsheets were illustrated with some of Vic's colourful pictures of creation and harvest which were also shown on the TV screen during the talk. One of the residents made a nice little thank you speech at the end!

I've been looking back at my notes for the services I have taken responsibility for since I took over from Christine nearly 3 years ago and realised that it will be 4 years since we last held a Carol Service at Windmill House. (There were several months, including December 2019, when there were no church services there due to changes in circumstances at the 3 churches which had been involved). Then after just one visit in Feb. 2020 the doors were closed to all visitors from March onwards. We started zoom services in May 2021 and continued every 2 months until May this year when we were finally able to go back in person. We had arranged to alternate with Wymondham Methodist Church throughout 2022 so there would be a service once a month but that has not happened for a several months.

It will be very special to be back at Windmill House to share a Carol Service this year. The whole house will be lavishly decorated and Fran Annis, the Wellbeing Lead, will have kept the residents busy and happy making things to be part of the display. Vic and Mary have family commitments and won't be able to accompany the carols so our son Matt has agreed to bring a keyboard and play for us. As we will be a smaller team than usual if there are 1 or 2 people who would like to join us please speak to me and I'll include you.

Our aim is always to be a blessing and an encouragement to everyone we meet when we visit Windmill House but we always come away feeling blessed and encouraged ourselves by the warm welcome we receive and the appreciation shown for this simple act of worship and service. Please pray for us as we prepare for and lead this service and spend time with the residents afterwards.

GLUTEN-FREE STOLLEN BITES

- 340 g gluten-free self raising flour
 ¼ tsp xanthan gum
 1 tsp gluten free baking powder
 85 g cold butter
 60 g caster sugar
 50 g ground almonds
 150 g marzipan grated
 100 g dried fruit chopped finely
 1 large egg
 150 ml milk
 3 tsp lemon juice
 2 tsp almond extract
 Zest of 1 lemon or orange
 lcing sugar for dusting
 - 1. Preheat Oven to 200C Fan/220C Prepare baking sheet with baking parchment
 - 2. Place GF self raising flour, baking powder and xanthan gum in a bowl. Chop cold butter into cubes and add to the flour. Rub in with your fingers until it forms what looks like breadcrumbs.
 - 3. Stir in caster sugar, ground almonds, grated marzipan and chopped dried fruit. Add zest of orange or lemon.
 - 4. Warm milk in a jug, don't make it really hot. Add lemon juice and allow to stand for 1-2 minutes it should curdle a little.
 - 5. Add the egg and almond extract to the milk mixture. Beat together so your egg is combined.
 - 6. Make a well in the middle of dry mixture. Pour in the milk/egg mixture and work it in using a metal fork or knife. Keep working it till it forms a sticky dough.
 - 7. Dust your hand and the surface with GF flour. Take a small amount of the dough and roll it in your hands into a slightly flattened ball. Place on prepared tray, leave gaps between each ball.
 - 8. Bake in the preheated oven for 12-15 minutes until golden.
 - 9. Remove from oven and allow to cool briefly on the tray before transferring to a cooling rack.
 - 10. Dust heavily with icing sugar and enjoy cold or slightly warm.



- It's read by a variety of people/voices from the 24-7 prayer team, including Pete Greig, author of a number of great books on prayer.






Home from Home -

2022 has been yet another very eventful year. We have had 3 Prime Ministers, a record breaking 70th Jubilee celebration followed by the death of our beloved monarch, a new King and war in Europe again. Our economy has been battered and bruised and families struggle to make ends meet.

For many families who have lost a loved one this year, 2022 will be a year they will never forget. Christmas can be yet another painful reminder of all that has been lost.

The build up to Christmas can be stressful and bring feelings of dread as we anticipate the empty space where our loved one should be.

I can imagine that the Royal family will find their Christmas this year is difficult and very different to what has gone before.

We are used to seeing the Queen's extended family gather together at Sandringham for Christmas and attend church on Christmas morning. We may not see that again as the New King decides to do things differently.

Often the older matriarch of a family has a way of bringing all members of the family together, perhaps organising a large collective celebration, carrying on familiar traditions, remembering what everyone likes to eat or gifts people like to receive. They can be like the glue that holds everyone together.

Of course, not everyone has an 'idyllic' Christmas or a family to share it with.

Christmas comes in all shapes, sizes and budgets. It is important to do what suits you at Christmas. There is no rule book.

This is also true with bereavement, there is no right or wrong way to grieve and timescales and intensity are unique to each person.

If you are bereaved, the following tips may help you decide how you want your Christmas to be this year:

- days instead.
- any people will understand.
- choose not to do this. However, others find this enables them to grieve, as they recall Christmases past.
- of real life no one should feel pressurised to feel 'jolly' at Christmas.
- Christmas movies portray happy loving families, beautifully (and expensively) decorated



 Some people find comfort in keeping their traditions the same- others find this is too painful and choose to do things very differently and invent new 'traditions' like going away for a few

• It can be painful signing just one name in Christmas cards so some people choose not to send

Putting up the usual tree and decorations can be loaded with difficult memories- some people

You may want to talk about your loved one at Christmas and include them as part of the celebration - raise a glass to them at lunch, celebrate the memories you shared together. Shedding a few tears is normal, healthy and shows you loved them. Tears and sadness are part

homes, snow on the ground and everyone getting along wonderfully. Most of us know this is pure fantasy! Take the pressure off yourself and do what is realistic and affordable instead.

- Throughout the Christmas period, spend some time alone if you need to. Go for a walk or run to relieve the pressure. Write in a journal about your thoughts and feelings.
- Some people choose to be alone on Christmas day and don't want the pressure of being around others. Others find that being around people can be a great distraction and support.
- If you cannot cope with parties this year, explain to the host that although you appreciate the invitation, you do not feel strong enough yet. On the other hand, you may find it comforting to be with others you can always leave early if it becomes overwhelming.

And finally, every year, Rosedale offers **Christmas candles** to anyone who is bereaved. At 11am on Christmas morning, we invite the lighting of the candle and time to pause and think about our loved one. Many others will be doing the same thing at the same time, so we know we are not alone in our grief. These are available now and can be collected from all the Rosedale branches in Norfolk and Suffolk - including Wymondham. Rosedale also holds Christmas services of remembrance in many towns in Norfolk and Suffolkcheck the Rosedale website for more details.

Wymondham Baptist Church and Rosedale work together to extend a warm welcome to anyone who has been bereaved, (no matter how long ago or which funeral director was used) to the Christmas Service of Remembrance at 7pm on the 8th of December. This service is another opportunity to pause and remember our loved ones at this special time of year.

Greener Christmas

This year, we are giving everyone the option of sending just one Christmas card to the fellowship at WBC by providing an attractive and dedicated board to display the cards. How big is your environmental footprint?

We would like to encourage everyone at WBC to complete a personal or household 'carbon calculator'. These surveys help us to work out how much CO₂ we emit in different areas of our lives – travel, energy, lifestyle etc. The results can be surprising and will hopefully lead us all to reflect on how we can make more small changes to reduce our own carbon footprint and so have a positive impact on God's earth.

We have chosen to complete the World Wildlife Fund Footprint Calculator because it is quick and easy to complete and does not require us to give any personal information other than a postcode.

WINDMILL HOUSE SERVICES



On Wednesday 14th December a team of us from WBC will be leading a Carol Service at Windmill House Care Home. This will be just the 4th time we have been back in person since before the start of the covid pandemic as care homes were cautious about opening their doors to visitors. It has been a real delight to be so warmly welcomed and to meet face-toface with the residents and some of the staff after a year of services on zoom.

In September we held a Harvest Thanksgiving Service which was appreciated by many residents, their visitors and some care staff. We try to include something visual to make things attractive so the songsheets were illustrated with some of Vic's colourful pictures of creation and harvest which were also shown on the TV screen during the talk. One of the residents made a nice little thank you speech at the end!

I've been looking back at my notes for the services I have taken responsibility for since I took over from Christine nearly 3 years ago and realised that it will be 4 years since we last held a Carol Service at Windmill House. (There were several months, including December 2019, when there were no church services there due to changes in circumstances at the 3 churches which had been involved). Then after just one visit in Feb. 2020 the doors were closed to all visitors from March onwards. We started zoom services in May 2021 and continued every 2 months until May this year when we were finally able to go back in person. We had arranged to alternate with Wymondham Methodist Church throughout 2022 so there would be a service once a month but that has not happened for a several months.

It will be very special to be back at Windmill House to share a Carol Service this year. The whole house will be lavishly decorated and Fran Annis, the Wellbeing Lead, will have kept the residents busy and happy making things to be part of the display. Vic and Mary have family commitments and won't be able to accompany the carols so our son Matt has agreed to bring a keyboard and play for us. As we will be a smaller team than usual if there are 1 or 2 people who would like to join us please speak to me and I'll include you.

Our aim is always to be a blessing and an encouragement to everyone we meet when we visit Windmill House but we always come away feeling blessed and encouraged ourselves by the warm welcome we receive and the appreciation shown for this simple act of worship and service. Please pray for us as we prepare for and lead this service and spend time with the residents afterwards.
