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A message from Paul Smith, our Pastor at WBC.....

The right direction.....such a funny phrase that. It's a bit like the one that goes along these lines...."how are you?" ..."oh I'm getting there"where might we ask is 'there'??? Is it me who

only ever ponders these thoughts? It's a strange answer really isn't it? Getting there and right direction will be on my mind over the summer months as we embark upon various different journeys through the holidays. We have planned a family time away, whereby once again I will be calling upon my old friend...the satnav!

We have a love hate relationship the satnav and I. My wife cringes whenever we have to turn on the satnav as she knows that at some point in the journey satnav and I are going to have a conversation based on the fact that it's telling me one thing and I want to do another.

I can almost guarantee that at a certain point on any given route it will tell me to go this way and I will think, no, this other road is quicker. And essentially that's what it will come down to, my arrogance that I think I know best and can get us there quicker.

A word from Rosedale bereavement support.......

Is there a correct way to grieve?

When faced with a bereavement for the first time, we might naturally look to what grief experts have to say on the subject.

There are many different theories about grief and how we might work through it. These different theories can be helpful to a point but can sometimes become a stick with which to beat ourselves. We can be made to feel that were not grieving 'properly' if we do not fit into the formula set out by a grief model. The truth is the only real expert on your grief, is YOU. Your grief is as unique to you, as is your relationship with the person who has died. We all have different personalities and ways of responding that are unique to us.

We can think of grief as a tangled ball of wool. Emotionally we can feel up and down, confused, angry, guilty, sad, relieved and as if we don't know which way to turn. We can feel there is no way out and we can't see the end.



It is important to remember that:

There is no right or wrong way to grieve.

There is no set time period for grief.

Others may suggest that you should be 'over it' by now. However, we can continue to grieve for our loved ones for the rest of our lives. Initially the grief is raw and all consuming, but usually over time this does ease. Though difficult, we do find a way to continue with life and the 'new normal' we are faced with. We will always think about them, love them and miss them, especially at certain times or on days when their absence is more deeply felt.

My experience is that over time grief becomes something that we learn to live alongside. I think of it as two parallel lines running alongside each other:

We do both at the same time.






In reality, we take the people we love with us, as we move forwards with life.

Do you miss parts of the church service because of a hearing loss, even though you have hearing aids?

Are you aware that the church has a very good hearing loop system for anyone using hearing aids that are fitted with a 'T' setting?

I have been using loop systems for several years and the system here is one of the best I have encountered.

Doug and the tech team have gone out of their way to make the loop work well, linking it with the headset microphone, room microphones and the worship team microphones.

I have tried it out and it works all around the hall no matter where you sit

(although it is better not right against one of the walls).

If you haven't got the 'T' setting on your hearing aids your audiologist should be able to sort it out in just a few minutes.

And - the loop setting can be found in many other places (such as banks, GP surgeries) wherever you see the sign:

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BURNING COALS

Proverbs 25:21-22 reads "If your enemy is hungry, give him food to eat; if he is thirsty, give him water to drink. In doing this, you will heap burning coals on his head, and the Lord will reward you." These verses unfortunately always conjured up an unpleasant image for me, I have a very literal mind.

But the verse is not about actually burning the person. (Yeah, I knew that really... ... errm...what a relief.) Studying it further, I found out that in Egypt there had been a custom to carry a pan of burning coals on one's head as a sign of repentance. So the phrase is intended as a metaphor for making your enemy feel a sense of shame and guilt for their actions, possibly leading them to repentance or at least remorse. The Proverb also promises that God will reward those who do good to their enemies, regardless of the person's response.

I pictured a blacksmith at work, heaping burning coals on to a piece of metal. It is thrust into the middle of the hot coals, and then more are heaped on top of it. The temperature is carefully monitored, to ensure that the metal reaches the right temperature and malleability for forging. Then the blacksmith can shape the metal into whatever he wishes to make.



It made me think about the hymn "Refiner's Fire", which contains the verses:

Purify my heart, let me be as gold and precious silver, Purify my heart, let me be as gold; pure gold Refiner's fire, my heart's one desire Is to be holy, set apart for you Lord I choose to be holy, set apart for You, my Master Ready to do Your will.

God is always at work in everyone's life, to bring us closer to Him even in the midst of hostility. Personally, I have had to repent many times of reacting badly or holding a grudge. But from this Proverb I can see a way forward, and pray that I will increase in my ability to love my enemies just as the Lord loves both them and me.
